The following schedule of work experience is intended as a guide. It need not be followed in any particular sequence, and it is understood that some adjustments may be necessary in the hours allotted for different work experience. In all cases, the apprentice is to receive sufficient experience to become fully competent and use good workmanship in all work processes that are a part of the trade. The apprentice will be fully instructed in safety and OSHA requirements. PLEASE NOTE: Connecticut Occupational Licensing Regulations require a minimum number of O.J.T. years (*calendar time*) as expressed below.

- A. To learn the purpose, operation and maintenance of all tools and machinery. (1000 HOURS)
- B. To learn to recognize the various formations in the ground, all their characteristics and how to work them to the best advantage in drilling the well. (500 HOURS)
- C. To learn the different ways water is found in the ground, to learn to develop a sound, stable well from any water strata encountered. To learn what water cannot be developed into a well. (1500 HOURS)
- D. To learn to make a proper pipe weld that will not leak or break. To learn to weld enough to take care of any repair welding necessary to the job. (500 HOURS)
- E. To learn and understand the relationships and responsibilities existing between the drilling contractor, his employees, and the customers. (500 HOURS)
- F. To learn respect for the drilling business and for his competitors and learning the different manufacturers, suppliers for equipment and tools. (500 HOURS)
- G. Pump installation and repair, on site. (1500 HOURS)
