Connecticut Department of Labor records indicate that you filed for Extended Benefits (EB). Your original monetary determination indicated that you were eligible for up to 13 weeks of Extended Benefits.

Under federal law, Extended Benefits are available when the Bureau of Labor Statistics determines that Connecticut's three-month average unemployment rate is at or above 6.5%. The state's three-month average unemployment rate is currently below 6.5%, which means that Connecticut filers are no longer allowed to collect benefits under the EB program.

What this means for filers:

- As of January 8, 2022, you will not be entitled to any further Extended Benefits regardless of the remaining balance in your EB claim.
- In accordance with federal law, the last EB payment will go out the week ending January 8, 2022.

CTDOL has multiple resources available to help job seekers:

- Contact one of the CTDOL American Job Centers for job search assistance including career counseling, employment workshops, job postings, and recruitment events.
- Register on CTHires, the state's job bank, to search for postings by employer, field of expertise, or geographical location.
