



## Over 60 Employers Registered for March 29 Job Fair at Manchester Community College

WETHERSFIELD, March 18, 2019 – More than 60 employers and organizations are registered to attend the Manchester Community College Regional Job Fair. The March 29 event, co-sponsored by the Connecticut Department of Labor, Manchester Community College, Journal Inquirer newspaper and MCC Alumni Association, takes place 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the college’s Great Path Academy gymnasium, 60 Bidwell Street.

“With employers seeking to find qualified candidates to fill jobs ranging from entry level to management, and in fields that include technical, medical and customer service and manufacturing, there will be plenty of opportunities for those seeking a new career or a different position,” said State Labor Commissioner Kurt Westby.

Companies already signed up for the Regional Job Center include Bright Horizons, Bridgeport Police Department, CTtransit, Dymotek Corporation, Fed Ex Ground, ITW Graphics and Pepperidge Farm.

As an additional service, volunteers from Capital Workforce Partners, the Goodwill Career Center and MCC Alumni Association will be available from 9 a.m. to noon to help with résumés and interviewing skills so jobseekers will be more effective when meeting with potential employers.
